## Reading

Our reading groups will be applying our phonics skill from last week (digraph review: ch, sh, th, wh) to reading a decodable text. If students have already mastered that skill, they may receive a

leveled book to read. Keep building your student's fluency as they read. Most students in class can now read without pointing. Let them take out their fingers and have their eyes do the work. Practice repeating certain phrases to make them sound like talking. Repeat lines as needed to make them become smooth.

During shared reading, we'll be talking and reading about the food we eat and where it comes from. While reading different texts, we'll discuss how good readers sometimes need to reread part of a story to make sure they understood it. We'll also talk about retelling what happened in a story in the correct sequence (ie: first, next, then, last).

#### Word Work/Phonics

We will be begin learning about the long a silent-e word pattern (ie: cave, date, lake, shape, maze, etc.). This is a silent-e syllable pattern. Long vowel silent-e words have a single vowel, a single consonant, an e at the end, and the vowel sound is long. Up to now, all our words have focused on closed syllable words with short vowel sounds. It might be tricky to change our thinking from short vowels to long vowels.

### Writing

Then, we'll spend time reviewing some writing conventions. I have many students that still struggle to remember to put spaces between every word. That will be a major focus this week!!

Plus, we will learn about contractions with the word "not". A contraction is a form or two words put together to form one word. An apostrophe takes the place of any letters that are removed. Have your child practice creating/writing and reading words as contractions. Give him/her two words (ie: are not) and have him/her create the contraction (ie: aren't). This can be a tricky skill. At the very least, see if your child can identify the two words that make a contraction.

#### Math

We'll begin learning about the connection between addition and subtraction facts. We want to use what we know about adding to help us solve subtraction equations (and vice versa). For example, knowing that 5+1=6 can help us solve 6-1=?. When we flip the problem around, that's basically creating a fact family. A fact family has 2 addition facts and 2 subtraction facts all made with the same numbers. For instance, the numbers 2, 4, & 6 can make two addition facts (2+4=6 or 4+2=6) and two subtraction facts (6-2=4 or 6-4=2). Knowing these "flip flops" and being able to move numbers around in addition and subtraction equations is an important skill for first grade. It means students have a deeper understanding of how addition and subtraction work together. We want to be able to turn an addition fact into a subtraction fact. Practice creating fact families by changing some addition equations into subtraction equations (and vice versa).

We'll continue to fit in our fact pages as time allows. This week, we are working on +6. In order to meet our goal of doing a complete page in 5 minutes, we are timing each row for a minute at a time. Usually, we can finish a row in a minute. I know that the more we do it the better we get. Watch for these papers to come home with your student. Feel free to correct any wrong answers or simply finish the problems if necessary.
