## Reading

Our reading groups will be applying our phonics skill from last week (phonogram review) to reading a decodable text. If students have already mastered that skill, they may receive a leveled book to read.

During shared reading, we'll be talking and reading about different structures and how they were built. While reading different texts, we'll discuss how good readers make ask and answer questions while they read. We'll also retell what happened by identifying cause and effect. A cause is how or why something happens. An effect is what happens.

We have practiced almost all of our First Grade Heart Words. These are words that don't follow typical spelling/phonics patterns. So, we need to know them "by heart". Take some time to
review the whole list in your child's homework folder. Practice any that your child may struggle to remember. The more practice the better! Sometimes, it can take up to 70 or more exposures to a word before it is really known! So, practice, practice, practice!

## Word Work/Phonics

We will learn about some predictable vowel teams this week. A vowel team has 2 or 3 letters side by side that are pronounced as 1 vowel sound. This week, we'll learn about ee, igh, oa and oe (ie: deep, keep, high, tight, boat, moan, Joe, goes, etc.).

## Writing

We will start learning about how to write opinions this week. In first grade, we keep this pretty simple. However, we want to have a topic, give clear reasons (at least 2-3), and finish with a closing sentence. We'll practice writing opinions with clear reasons on a few different topics. First graders should give quality reasons instead of the standard: "I like it." We'll work toward having reasons that can convince others to change their minds.

Otherwise, we will learn about prepositions and prepositional phrases. A preposition connects a noun or pronoun to another part of a sentence. A prepositional phrase begins with a preposition and ends with a noun or pronoun. For example, "The brown mole is IN the ground." The word "in" connects "the brown mole" to the phrase telling where it is ("the ground").

## Math

We spent most of last week reviewing our place value knowledge and 100s chart skills. Hopefully, we will be able to build upon that ability this week. There are a few students who would benefit from more time reviewing 1 more, 1 less, 10 more and 10 less than a given number. We mostly have it, but it would be a good homework review activity.

We will be working on adding with two-digit numbers. In particular this week, we want to be able to add and subtract multiples of ten (10, 20, 30, 40, etc.). For example, 46+ 30 or 7520. One of the best tools to use when solving these types of problems is our 100s chart because we can move up and down the columns to get 10 more/less. When working with multiples of ten, it means moving multiple rows of ten. Have your student practice adding and subtracting tens. Encourage them to use the 100s chart if they get stuck.

We have finished practicing math facts in class for this school year. I'll be giving some assessments in the coming weeks to check on accuracy within 20 and fluency within 10. From what I've seen, most students are fairly good at getting correct answers. However, some could use more fluency/speed. I encourage you to keep practicing these skills/facts. It creates a strong foundation for other mathematical skills.
