Reading

Our reading groups will be applying our phonics skill from last week (short i) to reading a decodable text. Plus, I'll also try to have each group have a leveled book to read. Remember to always have your child make an attempt to solve unknown words. They can use the pictures, check the beginning sounds, or even start to sound out words.

During shared reading, we'll be talking and reading about what makes pets special and how to take care of them. While reading different texts, we'll discuss how we can use the words and illustrations to visualize or create pictures in our minds. This is one strategy that helps us understand the text. We'll also talk about using key details to retell what happens in a story.

Word Work/Phonics

We will be focusing on the short a sound. However, there will be some ongoing review of sight words and blending. Plus, we will introduce syllables (parts of words) and phoneme segmentation (separating sounds in words). There are 6 different syllable types. Learning the 6 syllable types is key to reading more accurately and fluently. We will be learning about closed syllable words. Closed syllables have 1 vowel letter followed by 1 or more consonants and the vowel sound is short (ie: cat, fed, rip, etc.).

Writing

We are doing short mini-lessons on handwriting at the beginning of our writing time. We need to finish a letter from last week: Kk. Then, we will look at letters with tunnels - Nn & Hh. These letters get trickier as we go so we may spend more than one day on a letter as needed. Below are some prompts to help as you practice these letters at home. There is a formation guide in the homework folder as well. Don't forget - THERE ARE NO LETTERS THAT START AT THE BOTTOM!!

N - down, slant down, up n - down, up, over H - down, down, across h - dow . . . n, up, over

During Writer's Workshop, we will be talking talking about a particular type of sentence: statements. Statements are sentences that tell something. We need to remember that a statement ends with a period. We'll also continue talking about how to make descriptive sentences. A sentence needs to tell a whole idea (with a capital and a period). A descriptive sentence tells about size, look, number, shape or color. Try turning a simple sentence into a descriptive sentence. For example, "I have a cat." could become "I have a white and black cat that is soft."

Math

We continue working with addition this week. This is a skill that will take lots of work throughout the year. Last week, we focused a lot on the strategies we could use (fingers, number line, etc.) and being able to "count on" to find the answer. Please encourage your child to "count on" as he/she adds at home. This week, we will continue building our understanding of addition by learning about our "ten friends" (numbers that add to make ten).

We will also start practicing some fact pages this week. The goal in first grade is to get 90% accurate in 5 minutes. This will take some practice. We'll start with our +0 facts. Sometimes it can be trickier than you think to add with a zero. Watch for these papers to come home with your student. Feel free to correct any wrong answers or simply finish the problems if necessary.
